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





ADAM SMITH

Smith advocated that a government should maintain only the law, courts, civil engineering, and nominal regulations, believing that an unfettered marketplace worked to the best advantage of all.





LUDWIG VON MISES

(1881 - 1973) is the father of the Austrian School of Economics, a laissez-faire, capitalist expression of economics and government. His influence can be found in the works of Murray Rothbard, Frederick Hayek, Milton Friedman, The Foundation for Economic Education, to name just a few. Von Mises' work was largely ignored by most economic schools of thought until about 20 years ago, even though his classic work, Human Action, was released in 1949.

JOSIAH WARREN

The father of American Anarchism, Josiah Warren lived from 1798 to 1874 and founded voluntaryist villages that were based on economic and personal laissez-faire. His first anarchist colony was called Equity, in Ohio, and it was short lived, while his second anarchist community, Utopia, thrived longer, and his final experimental anarchist community, Modern Times, was founded in 1851, existing today as Brentwood, Long Island, (though it has evolved scarred by state control along with the rest of the USA). Among those Warren influenced were Benjamin Tucker (Liberty Magazine), William Greene, Stephen Pearl Andrews.





HENRY DAVID THOREAU (1817 - 1862) Henry David Thoreau's relatively small published output in his own lifetime (2 books and only a few magazine articles) is a testament to the power of his pacifistic and libertarian beliefs that live on today. Thoreau is cited by both Martin Luther King, Jr., and Mahatma Gandhi as influences in peaceful civil disobedience. Thoreau's one night in jail for refusing to pay several years poll taxes as a protest against slavery and the U.S.-Mexican War catapulted him into writing his "On Civil Disobedience" (originally called "Resistance to Civil Government").







MARIA MONTESSORI (1870 - 1952), is the pioneer and developer of the method of child education known as the Montessori Method: a student-centred. individualistic and rationally-based form of teaching. Born in Italy, Maria Montessori began teaching her now famous methods to mentally handicapped children in 1900, then she opened her first school in a Rome slum in 1907 for normal children, (merchants gave her the building free in the hopes that her teaching would keep unruly children off the streets and reduce vandalism!) From this humble beginning, the Montessori Method is used in over 5,000 independent schools worldwide, offering a clear alternative to the tragedy of the state-dominated schools that blight the western world.




